

Bryn Mawr College Profile

Founded in 1885, Bryn Mawr College is a small private liberal arts institution primarily for women located in the Philadelphia suburb of Lower Merion County/ Main Line. The school itself is actually situated geographically within the residential community of Bryn Mawr Pennsylvania. The footprint of the site is split into 2 large facilities, one being the north/western edge of the campus adjacent to school's playing fields, the second being the south, eastern edge of the campus by Merion Avenue. The Carey/ Thomas Great Hall links both sides of the campus together with a large grassy area called the campus green. Bryn Mawr is unique because it has a large suburban school feel to it, while still being small in regard to student population. The campus also has several buildings with Gothic architecture that are beautiful to look at. These historic buildings make the campus look very big, but it feels smaller than the observed geographical footprint.

The college has a large footprint of approximately 135 acres of park like property within the Main Line suburb of Philadelphia. The physical layout observes numerous historic buildings shared by students, and local residents. The campus itself has approximately 57 buildings including lecture, residential, research, and dining facilities that were originally designed by Frederick Olmstead, and Calvert Vaux. These architects designed New York's Central Park and now the school is listed in the national register of historic places. The overall physical layout of the campus is typical of a college setting with wide sidewalks; grass field meeting places, and park like benches but the campus building architecture is far from typical.

The pedestrian flow of traffic within the facility was centered mainly between the arches at Pembroke Hall, and the grassy area around the residence halls and Merion Green. The student center in the northeast corner of the campus also had heavy pedestrian traffic during my visit. My student tour guide also told me that student center stays busy at all hours of the day when school is in session. The campus buildings and open spaces were also very clean and well maintained during my observations. These open spaces allow students the ability to interact with each other in a non-educational manner due to the high number of observed meeting places on campus.

Bryn Mawr students, faculty, and employees enjoy a community, within a community lifestyle in regard to on, and off campus activities and resources. The college also provides several critical student resources including student housing on campus for all 4 years, which helps students connect with each other throughout the year. Bryn Mawr is a beautiful campus that has maintained it's local roots despite it's growth, and national appeal.

The published demographic information for the college describes a culturally diverse student population with students from all across the world. Bryn Mawr College has developed a large campus community to offer students an excellent Liberal Arts and Science educational format to enhance it's commitment to different types of career endeavors.

Bryn Mawr College: The College is home to relatively small campus population of approximately 25 male, and 1,260 female full, and 50 female part time students. Bryn Mawr also has a graduate school population of 85 male, 370 female students enrolled. The average age of a freshman is 18 years old. 20% of students are from Pennsylvania. Others are from 47 states, and 44 foreign countries. Students on campus provide a diverse multi-cultural makeup including 50% of students are white, 12% Asian Americans, 6% are Black, 11% are Hispanic, and 20% are the race is unknown.

Published Academic Standards for Admission Programs

Bryn Mawr College has a large educational system for a small private school, which offers Liberal Arts, and Sciences programs. Below is a specific list of under graduate admission requirements.

Bryn Mawr College: Freshman Class: 2,106 applied, 958 accepted, 352 enrolled. SAT Verbal 680, SAT Math 630. ACT 29. Application Deadline Fall Early Decision: November 15, Winter Early Decision: January 1, Regular Decision: January 15.

Faculty/ Classroom: 50% of faculty is male, 50% female. All both teach and do research. The average class size in an introductory lecture is 25; laboratory, 15; and in a regular course, 16.

Student / Faculty Ratio: 8 to 1

Retention Rate: 3% do not continue beyond 1st year, 85% remain to graduate.

Campus Footprint: An observation of the internal campus setting provides students and employees with several types of student services including physical fitness, residence, library services, and cultural meeting places and dining halls. I observed heavy pedestrian traffic from this area of the campus due to the location of the dining hall, and the time of day. The internal footprint of the school is oval shaped with students reading, eating, and talking to each other in the middle of Merion Green. This an interesting point to make in regard to the school's location within a suburb of a major city. When you walk onto the Bryn Mawr campus you forget where you are for the moment, the campus landscape is big, beautiful, and historic.

The university's observed focal point of reference during the campus tour was the area in, and around the Mariam Canaday Library, which is the center of the campus. Student pedestrian sidewalks all converge at this point from several locations around the campus including the academic, and residence halls. When you look at the campus map you can easily observe the main focal point. My tour guide told us that students come to the grassy areas around the library to relax and talk about school and life.

The design and physical setting of Bryn Mawr is unique because the campus is located within a small suburban setting with several small private K-12 schools around it. The physical security footprint is also unique because the college uses physical landscaping, not metal fencing around the school's perimeter to give it a welcoming, and private community feel to it. This physical barrier provides access control to several vehicle, and pedestrian entrances, which requires I.D. for access control in the day, and night as well.

The internal campus footprint is unique because the school is split into 2 parts, including a large open field area for team sports, and the traditional college campus area with several residence, lecture, and student services halls on opposite ends of the campus. The college's performing arts, and recreation buildings are situated in the middle for easy access from all points of the campus footprint

The physical landscape of the college allows students to get away from classes to retreat to their residence halls, which are located on both ends of the school. These types of structures enhance the campus lifestyle within the schools sprawling footprint. The buildings geographical design features form a large oval in which students can enter, and leave the campus from several locations. Parking resources is also a big feature on campus due to the limited number of parking permits issued to students and employees. Parking is a big challenge for public safety at Bryn Mawr because the college is located in a small community with a limited number of parking lots for students, employees, and visitors. Students at the college have access to a main line (SEPTA) train station within walking distance to the campus, which helps limit the need for student parking permits.

The college is also linked together by several township streets within it's massive real estate holdings with virtually all of the university's lecture halls, arts & science pavilions, residence halls, and historic buildings tied within it's large real estate holdings. The footprint of the college is unique because students can retreat to their residence halls, or they can travel to other facilities to experience big campus living. The City of Philadelphia is only 30 minutes away by train for students who want to enjoy the city life. The City of Philadelphia is called One Big Campus because the city has over 18 public, and private schools within a relatively short distance to each other. These types of educational, and social resources enhance the campus community lifestyle within each schools urban & suburban footprint because students can travel to several areas in a short period of time.

Finally, Bryn Mawr has a classic historical northeastern campus feel to it because the school is located in a small suburban town in Montgomery County Pennsylvania. This area is also filled with historic architecture, parks, mixed residential properties in Bryn Mawr & Lower Merion Township, with additional commercial properties on Lancaster Avenue in neighboring Ardmore & Radnor Townships. Bryn Mawr College takes up a great portion of real estate in this exclusive area with 135 acres and over 57 buildings within it's sprawling landscape.

Local weather: Weather is also an issue to consider for students preparing for a college experience. Philadelphia enjoys all four seasons of weather including rain and snow. Northeast weather patterns sometimes allow for temperatures to drop below 32 degrees for a considerable amount of time during the winter. Pennsylvania also gets it's share of rain during the spring and summer months as well. A strong indicator of pedestrian traffic around the university can be identified by the northeast weather patterns. Student parking within close proximity to university buildings and student shuttle services help reduce the exposure literally and figuratively.

Community Profile

The Township of Bryn Mawr has been described as an affluent suburban town within commuter distance to a major city. The town itself has grown around its local college with students, and local residents enjoying the Main Line community's economical, and cultural landscape. The township has also been described as a student friendly community with several private colleges, and k-12 schools situated along Lancaster Avenue. Bryn Mawr also has an intellectual side due to its historical neighborhood architecture and close physical relationship to the above-mentioned schools. The township is favorable to students and local residents because it offers a local pedestrian walkway on Lancaster Avenue, which links students, visitors, and local residents to a large number of restaurants and local shops within the walking distance to the campus.

The community has a small city feel to it when you are walking to neighborhood parks and eateries on the southern edge of town. Residents and students also enjoy several social destinations on Lancaster Avenue including nightclubs, movie theatres, and food stores which are in walking distance to the campus. The walk from Bryn Mawr's eastern edge to the above-mentioned meeting places is approximately 10 minutes. Students can also walk off the campus to the town train station to find the Norristown Line for (SEPTA), which provides public transportation to the City of Philadelphia.

The Township of Bryn Mawr is located within the northeastern area of the state, which makes it convenient to several suburban communities and highway networks. SEPTA provides high-speed rail service in the area with the Norristown Line. This rail corridor links to the 30th Street Station which is a main link to several different commuter trains and the northeast corridor. The 30th Street Station also links to Amtrak, New Jersey Transit, and the Philadelphia International Airport via the R-1 line. Bryn Mawr also has several main roadways that connect the community to major state highways including Routes 1, 76 and 476 that links to the Pennsylvania Turnpike, and Interstate 95. Shopping, restaurants, and hotel chains can be found within these major transportation networks after a short drive from the campus. Appendix #1 on the back page of this profile lists several of observed resources in close proximity to the school.

The following demographics for Bryn Mawr Township describe a multi-cultural community within a total population of 4,382 according to the U.S. Census Bureau. Bryn Mawr College has strong relationships with the township because they share community services including public safety, and cultural resources. An example of this commitment can be observed through the university's community services handbook that describes educational programs, health care programs and services, legal programs and services to local residents who may require community help.

A Census Bureau community survey highlights several characteristics to describe the population including: 1,390 residents are male, 2,992 are female. 78.6% of residents are white, 10.4% are African American, 3% is Hispanic or Latino, and 7.3% are Asian. The median age of population is 22.5 years old. 91.6% of residents are 18 years old or over, 65.8 % are over 21, and 10.5% of township residents is over the age of 65. The issue of housing in Bryn Mawr is also interesting. 94.8% of all housing units within the township are occupied. 62.5% of housing units are renter-occupied, while 37.5% of units are owner-occupied. Only 5.2% of total available housing was vacant.

Campus Life

Bryn Mawr College is a multi-cultural campus environment that provides students with an outstanding social, and educational atmosphere. The admissions demographics paint a picture of a very diverse community with students from all over the world. The local suburban community of Main Line only adds to the universities international status because the community has multi-cultural roots as well. Bryn Mawr College addresses the issue of ecology in a positive way with the campus being registered as a national historical site. The school has also developed green technologies and architecture for the campus including a library designed to look like anthropology dig site. And finally, the campus was clean and well maintained and the economic conditions are favorable to students and local residents due to the available services in walking distance to the school.

The emotional climate of the entire community is positive because students are involved with local community, and campus groups through the college's Civic Engagement program. An observation of this very positive emotional climate can be found by looking at the endless student flyers posted throughout the campus on walls, doors, windows, and light poles. These flyers describe upcoming activities and they invite all students to enjoy the clubs, performing arts, and public discussions on world events. Bryn Mawr's students also enjoying displaying personal items in their residence doorways, which highlights the school's honor code. Social networking beyond the campus walls is also a very important issue to be observed at Bryn Mawr. Students at the college are encouraged to participate in externships with alumni to gain real world experience in each student's major. These programs, along with internships, and global learning centers offer valuable information for students studying abroad, which helps round out their individual educational activities on campus.

This issue of school culture and emotional attachment is also a very important part of campus life because everyone wants to have a connection and emotional fit to their new school and community. The college has done a great job developing positive social systems with it's students by providing a series of coordinated programs including workshops and seminars for freshman students. This type of process provides a foundation for learning and personal growth providing over 100 academic, and athletic clubs, and student organizations. Bryn Mawr also has 12 NCAA Division III teams for students to participate in.

Campus life at Bryn Mawr can be considered intellectual, and social due to several notable student venues including the Neuberger campus center, which is the main student recreational center on campus. The college also has a performing arts venue that provides entertainment, and educational programs within the Goodheart Theatre. These on campus facilities allows students to enjoy more than academic excellence, it gives them the opportunity to develop social relationships by experiencing school sports, performing arts, history, cultural events, restaurants, and local museums together.

Bryn Mawr has also developed a “Tri-College Consortium” with Swarthmore, and Haverford Colleges that allows students from each of these institutions to share educational, and social resources throughout the year. These schools are located within a short drive of the college within the suburban Philadelphia community of Main Line. Students receive daily shuttle services to all three schools to maintain these newly acquired relationships. Bryn Mawr also provides it’s students with cross-registration educational resources with the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, but the school doesn’t provide a shuttle, students have to take public transportation.

Students at Bryn Mawr also have the ability to enjoy suburban sports activities within the Delaware Valley including it’s consortium schools and big institutions like Villanova and Saint Joseph’s. These schools participate on the big stage in regard to Division I NCAA sports including the Big East Conference. Students can enjoy these big campus sports events within several local colleges throughout the year. Students can also enjoy cultural, and social events on these campuses, or take the train to Philadelphia to enjoy big city life.

Student Housing: The purpose of student housing is to provide safe and reasonable accommodations for students living away from home. The issue of housing and dormitory life is a critical element of overall campus life because students spend a large amount of time in their rooms. Student housing units historically come in 3 different styles including traditional corridor, suite, and apartment style units.

Bryn Mawr College guarantees on campus housing for all four years through a lottery system. The college also has a unique way of providing housing for students. The college doesn’t have freshman dorms, it has upper classmen living on the floors so new students can learn, what they need to learn about the school in a more relaxed fashion. Off Campus Housing: Bryn Mawr has been described as a small private college within an affluent residential community. The reason I have mentioned the overall community is to re-assert the point that school’s network of facilities, along with several other private K-12 schools has encapsulated the real estate holdings in the area. The campus footprint allows every student to have housing within walking distance to college facilities. The issue of off campus housing has a different feel to it compared to other university housing demands. The college itself has 98% of it’s student population living on campus which reduces the need, or demand for off campus housing. Students who want off campus housing can find information about available resources on the quick links page.

Public Transportation: Campus transportation resources for students are available through the college's shuttle system, which provides van service for daily classes, student activities, and links to local shopping and restaurants. This service is crucial to students who don't have cars because it provides transportation services to the entire community. Bryn Mawr students also have a high-speed (SEPTA) station on Lancaster Avenue, which runs along the Norristown Line. This service usually takes 20 minutes to arrive in the city according to school officials.

The school's van service provides reliable transportation to students who don't, or can't have vehicles on campus. The college also has a very large number of out of state students who don't know the streets and highways very well. Knowing the area is key because students who come from local states may know the area better and may be able to walk or drive to local destinations. Foreign, and out of state students might opt to take a bus or train to their destination because they don't want to risk getting lost on local roads.

Description of Campus Public Safety Plans & Procedures: Campus communities are unique places due to their populations and physical layouts. In some areas of the United States you really can't tell where a campus begins or ends because people walk through, drive through, and take campus transportation through all areas of the campus footprint. Bryn Mawr College has developed public safety plans and procedures to keep students, and employees safe. The school's general public safety plans and procedures can be found in the document "Emergency Preparedness Plan" which gives students and employees a list of instructions, procedures, codes of conduct, and response strategies to follow while on campus. Crisis Management Plans & Procedures Local Community

The State of Pennsylvania has developed emergency management resources to help residents to prepare, respond, and recover from a host of natural, and man made events. The state agency responsible for emergency operations is the Emergency Management Agency. Contact information for this state agency www.readypa.org

Innovative Emergency Communications: Bryn Mawr College has developed reverse 911 systems that sends several types of emergency notifications through e-mail and phone text message systems. Campus alerts, and weather related information is sent through this system. The university also has active shooter protocols for students to follow during an emergency including lock-down, and lockout procedures. These messages are usually received within 1-2 minutes of emergency broadcast and allow university officials to adhere to Clery Act requirements for timely warnings of emergency events.

Campus Access Control & Security Systems: The design, and physical setting of a particular institution has elements relating to the overall culture and social system on campus. Since college and university campuses are designed to offer (open) movement of people through it's borders, the issue of design, along with effective use of space can reduce both the incidence, and fear of crime. This design feature is called "Crime Prevention through Environmental Control." The proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime and an improvement in the quality of life. The issues of identifying formal gathering and high-risk areas within a campus footprint are also critical to public safety resources because manpower must be observed in these areas.

The design and physical setting of Bryn Mawr College is unique for a suburban campus because the footprint has historical value due to it's famous landscape architects. The campus map highlights several historic buildings, and large grassy areas, which form a large barrier around the main campus. These buildings, along with natural landscaping form a large oval that's several city block long, and wide. These physical security design features seem to have enhanced the footprint by using natural, and manmade resources to limit access to the overall campus.

The college has several entrances and exits to maximize the pedestrian traffic flow within the facility, the issue of vehicle traffic on campus is minimal due to the suburban setting and a limited number of street parking spots. Bryn Mawr's public safety department deploys officers to several access points around the campus during the day to reduce the number of people who may not have legitimate business on campus. Public safety also maintains visitor screening with clearly worded signage that directs visitors to a welcome area within Benham Gateway (Admissions), visitors who wish to walk around the campus without an escort can, but only during daylight hours.

Formal gathering areas within the campus are situated in, and around Merion Green, which is directly out side the student center. The area around the green also has several residence, and academic halls that connect the quad to the Marion Park Science Center on the eastern edge of the campus. These areas are the main observed focal points of the campus with several large grassy areas in and around the lecture, and the student center. The quad is a textbook example of CPTED design because it allows for natural surveillance and open space for people to enjoy while still providing some type of ownership within the property.

The issue of high-risk areas on campus has been identified during annual risk assessments by security, and feedback by all intuitional stakeholders including public safety officials. The department maintains uniform patrol, fixed security posts, and high tech remote resources to highlight formal surveillance throughout the campus. The department also has security officers patrolling on foot in several high-risk areas including the student center, sports venues, residence halls, and the library. Bryn Mawr public safety officers also patrol the exterior of the college in several types of vehicles including 4-wheel drive trucks.

Bryn Mawr's public safety officers don't have formal arrest powers; they have to notify Lower Merion Township Police to investigate criminal activity on campus. The school's public safety department has developed enhanced lighting, student honor codes, and formal surveillance resources (CCTV) for perimeter areas because it helps with surveillance and gives students and visitors an enhanced feeling of safety and security. The campus high-risk areas including the residence halls require a higher degree of natural and formal surveillance for students and visitors. The College uses HD Proximity Card Readers for access to campus residence facilities. Students on campus are safe in my opinion due to the extremely low crime rate, and the positive social resources on, and off campus.

Descriptions of Published Policies and Procedures to Comply with the Clery Act

The Clery Act. The Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990 requires all postsecondary institutions participating in the Title IV student financial aid programs to disclose campus crime statistics, university violations and disciplinary data, and finally security information to the U.S. Department of Education on an annual basis. The legislation also describes several required policy statements that address public safety and security issues. Below is a sample list of Clery Act Policy Statements for colleges and universities to publish each year within their prospective crime report/audits.

Required policy statements include: addressing timely warnings, disclosure of crime statistics, reporting criminal offenses, confidential reporting, security and access control, arrest authority, security awareness programs, crime prevention programs, sex offenses, alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, substance abuse programs, and general codes of conduct. Bryn Mawr's Clery Act info can be found on the quick links page.

Caveat: Bryn Mawr College public safety officers don't have arrest powers; but it's officers have Special Officer Training. The school calls Lower Merion Township Police for help with crime issues on campus. The college does provide security resources on campus but the following statement from the department education offers this advice. "The department data reported by the institutions have not been subjected to independent verification by the U.S. Department of Education. Local Crime Statistics: The Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Report for 2008 has developed crime statistics for Lower Merion Township Pennsylvania. In 2008 the Police Department reported 26 Violent Crimes, 0 Murders, 1 Forcible Rape, 18 Robberies, 7 Aggravated Assaults, 949 Property Crimes, 147 Burglaries, 766 Larceny Thefts, and finally 36 Motor Vehicle Thefts. The crime of Arson was reported 0 times in 2008.

Emergency Medical Technicians: Bryn Mawr College has public safety officers who respond with the township's Fire Department EMS to provide ambulance service to students, residents, and visitors through emergency notification systems.
