

Saint Joseph's University Profile

Founded in 1851, Saint Joseph's is a relatively large private Catholic institution located in the Philadelphia suburb of Delaware Valley/Main Line. The school itself is actually situated geographically within the 2 residential communities of Philadelphia, and Lower Merion Township. The footprint of the site is split into 2 large facilities, one being the old campus, and the other being the new Maquire campus across the street. St. Joe's is unique because it has an urban, and suburban school feel to it. The university has a large footprint of approximately 98 acres of park like property within the historic City of Philadelphia. The physical layout observes numerous historic buildings shared by students, and local residents. The campus itself has approximately 88 buildings including lecture, residential, research, and dining facilities.

The overall physical layout of the campus is typical of a college setting with wide sidewalks, grass field meeting places, and park like benches. The pedestrian flow of traffic within the facility was centered between both campuses during my daytime visit. Students use a footbridge to cross City Avenue (Route 1), which cuts the campus into 2 parts. Students use the bridge on a regular basis because both sides of the campus have lecture, residential, and athletic fields to use. I observed heavy foot traffic in, and around Campion student center, and Hagan recreation center during my campus tour.

The St Joe's buildings and open spaces were very clean and well maintained during my observations. These open spaces allow students the ability to interact with each other in a non-educational manner due to the high number of observed meeting places on campus. SJU students, faculty, and employees enjoy a community, within a community lifestyle in regard to on, and off campus activities and resources. The only negative is the shortage of student housing on campus due to the school's growth, and national appeal.

The published demographic information for the university describes a culturally diverse student population with students from all across the world. Saint Joseph's University has developed a large campus facility to offer students a Liberal Arts and Science, and Business Administration educational format to enhance it's commitment to different types of career endeavors.

Saint Joseph's University: The University is home to approximately 2,054 male, and 2,193 female full time students, and 383 male, and 513 female part time students. The university also has a large graduate school population with 1,047 male, and 1,524 female students enrolled at the school. The average age of a freshman is 18 years old. 53% of students are from Pennsylvania. Others are from 39 states, and 34 foreign countries. Students on campus provide a diverse multi-cultural religious makeup including 64% Catholic, 11% Protestant, 6% other non-Christian & non-Jewish, and finally 18% claim no religious affiliation. 81% of students are white, 3% Asian Americans, 8% are Black, 3% are Hispanic, and 5% are the race is unknown.

Published Academic Standards for Admission Programs

Saint Joseph's University has a large educational system that offer Liberal Arts, and Business Administration Graduate, and under graduate programs. Below is a specific list of under graduate admission requirements.

Saint Joseph's University: Freshman Class: 8,779 applied, 5,407 accepted, 1090 enrolled. SAT Verbal 570, SAT Math 580. ACT 25 Application Deadline February 1.

Faculty/ Classroom: 60% of faculty is male, 40% female. All both teach and do research. The average class size in an introductory lecture is 25; laboratory, 13; and in a regular course, 20.

Student / Faculty Ratio: 16 to 1

Retention Rate: 10% do not continue beyond 1st year, 78% remain to graduate.

Campus Footprint: An observation of the internal campus setting provides students and employees with several types of student services including physical fitness, residence, library services, and cultural meeting places and dining halls. I observed heavy pedestrian traffic from this area of the campus due to the location of the dining hall, and the time of day. The internal footprint of the school is shaped like a big square with students reading, eating, and talking to each other in the middle of the quad. This an interesting point to make in regard to the school's location within a major city. When you walk onto the St Joe's campus you forget where you are for the moment, the campus landscape is beautiful.

The university's observed focal point of reference during the campus tour was the area in, and around Finnesey Field, which is the center of the campus. Student pedestrian sidewalks all converge at the field from several locations around the campus including the academic, and residence halls. When you look at the campus map you can easily observe the main focal point. My tour guide told us that students come to the grassy area around the field to relax and talk about school and life.

The design and physical setting of Saint Joseph's University is unique because the campus is located within a large urban & suburban setting. The physical security footprint is also unique because the university has metal fencing around the perimeter giving it gated community feel to it. This physical barrier provides access control to several vehicle, and pedestrian entrances, which requires I.D. for access control in the day, and night as well. The internal campus footprint is unique because the school is split into 2 parts with residence, lecture, and student services halls on opposite ends with performing arts, and recreation buildings in the middle.

The footprint of the college allows students to get away from classes to retreat to their residence halls. This type of structure enhances the campus lifestyle within the schools sprawling footprint. The buildings geographical design features form a large square in which students can enter, and leave the campus from several locations. Parking resources is also a big feature on campus due to the large number of parking permits issued to students and employees. The university also has a large graduate school population who

require parking services on campus, not to mention the daily academic, and sports activities that visitors enjoy while on the campus. Parking is a big challenge for public safety at St Joe's. The university only has a limited number of parking lots for students, employees, and visitors. These parking lots maintain the campus perimeter because they act almost like a second natural barrier for safety and security.

The university is also linked together by several city streets within its massive real estate holdings with virtually all of the university's lecture halls, arts & science pavilions, residence halls, and historic buildings tied within its large real estate holdings. The footprint of the college is unique because students can retreat to their residence halls, or they can travel to other facilities to experience big campus living. The City of Philadelphia is called "One Big Campus" because the city has over 18 public, and private schools within a relatively short distance to each other. These types of resources enhance the campus lifestyle within each school's urban footprint because students can walk to several areas of the campus within minutes.

Saint Joseph's University has a classic northeastern campus feel to it because the school is located in the City of Philadelphia within the neighborhood of Delaware Valley/ Main Line. This area is filled with historic architecture and mixed residential, and commercial properties in, and around the university. St Joe's takes up a great portion of real estate in the area with 98 acres and over 88 buildings. I have mentioned a description of the massive real estate holdings because you are more likely to see an St Joe's public safety official than a Police Officer from the Philadelphia Police Department in this general area.

Local weather: Weather is also an issue to consider for students preparing for a college experience. Philadelphia enjoys all four seasons of weather including rain and snow. Northeast weather patterns sometimes allow for temperatures to drop below 32 degrees for a considerable amount of time during the winter. Pennsylvania also gets its share of rain during the spring and summer months as well. A strong indicator of pedestrian traffic around the university can be identified by the northeast weather patterns. Student parking within close proximity to university buildings and student services help reduce the exposure literally and figuratively.

Community Profile

Lower Merion Township has been described as an affluent suburban town that feels like a small city with 59,850 residents in Montgomery County Pennsylvania. The township has also been described as a family centered residential community within striking distance to Philadelphia. Lower Merion has an intellectual side due to its historical neighborhood architecture and close physical relationship with Saint Joseph's & Villanova Universities. The township is favorable to students and local residents because it offers a local pedestrian walkway on City Avenue, which links local residents to a large number of restaurants and local shops within the eastern edge of town. City Line & Lancaster Avenues are the main thoroughfares that travel north & west connecting several local towns to the university.

The community has a small city feel to it when you are walking to neighborhood eateries on the eastern edge of town. Residents and students enjoy several social destinations when walking east on City Line Avenue including Hawks Landing that offers coffee shops, bars, restaurants, and the New St Joe's Basketball Facility, which is located a couple of blocks away. The walk from St Joe's main gate to the above-mentioned meeting places is approximately 15 minutes from the campus. Students who walk off the campus and make a left turn to the western edge of City Line Avenue will mostly find suburban living except for the Overbrook Train Station for (SEPTA), which provides public transportation to the City of Philadelphia. This section of real estate becomes Lower Merion Township 4 blocks west of St. Joe's on City Line Avenue toward Lancaster Avenue.

The township itself is located within the northeastern area of the state, which makes it convenient to several suburban communities and highway networks. SEPTA provides local rail service in the area with the R-5 Thorndale Line. This rail corridor links to the 30th Street Station which is a main link to several different commuter trains and the northeast corridor. The 30th Street Station also links to Amtrak, New Jersey Transit, and the Philadelphia International Airport via the R-1 line. Lower Merion also has several main roadways that connect the community to major state highways including Route 1, 76, and 476 that links to the Pennsylvania Turnpike, and Interstate 95. Shopping, restaurants, and hotel chains can be found within these major transportation networks after a short drive from the campus. Appendix #1 on the back page of this profile lists several of observed resources in close proximity to the school.

The following demographics for Lower Merion Township describe a multi-cultural community within a total population of 59,850 according to the U.S. Census Bureau. St. Joe's University has a strong relationship with this diverse community. An example of this commitment can be observed through the university's community services handbook that describes educational programs, health care programs and services, legal programs and services to local residents who may require community help.

A Census Bureau community survey highlights several characteristics to describe the population including: 27,232 of residents are male, 32,618 are female. 90% of residents are white, 4.5% are African American, 1.6% is Hispanic or Latino, and 3.4% are Asian. The median age of population is 28 years old. 78% of residents are 18 years old or over and 18% of township residents is over the age of 65. The issue of housing in Lower Merion is also interesting. 96% of all housing units within the township are occupied. 24.5% of housing units are renter-occupied, while 75.5% of units are owner-occupied. Only 4% of total available housing was vacant.

Campus Life

Saint Joseph's University is a multi-cultural campus environment that provides students with an outstanding social, and educational atmosphere. The admissions demographics paint a picture of a very diverse community with students from all over the world. The local community of Delaware Valley/ Main Line only adds to the universities international status because the community has multi-cultural roots as well. St. Joe's also addresses the issue of ecology in a positive way. The physical environment is clean and well maintained and the economic conditions are favorable to students and local residents due to the available services in walking distance to the school.

The emotional climate of the entire community is positive because students are involved with local community groups. An observation of this very positive emotional climate can be found by looking at the endless student flyers posted throughout the campus on walls, doors, windows, and light poles. These flyers describe upcoming activities and they invite all students to enjoy the clubs, performing arts, and public discussions on world events. St. Joe's students went as far as hanging banners outside residence halls to invite students to attend social events on campus, which was very nice.

This issue of school culture and emotional attachment is also a very important part of campus life because everyone wants to have a connection and emotional fit to their new school and community. St. Joe's has done a great job developing positive social systems with it's students by providing a series of coordinated programs including workshops and seminars for freshman students. This type of process provides a foundation for learning and personal growth providing over 94 academic clubs, student organizations, and over 30 intramural sports activities. St. Joe's also has 3 national fraternities for men, and 4 national sororities for women.

Campus life at St. Joe's is more than academic excellence; it's about school sports, fraternities, performing arts, history, cultural events, restaurants, and local museums. The university also has several global education centers in the area for students to learn, and gather information about studying abroad. St. Joe's students enjoy campus sports activities within the Hagan recreational center, and several multi use fields around campus including the Finnesey turf field in the middle of campus. St. Joe's currently participates in 9 NCAA Division I Varsity Sports for Women and Men, and the university is building a new field house for students to watch, and enjoy university sports while on campus.

Student Housing: The purpose of student housing is to provide safe and reasonable accommodations for students living away from home. The issue of housing and dormitory life is a critical element of overall campus life because students spend a large amount of time in their rooms. Student housing units historically come in 3 different styles including traditional corridor, suite, and apartment style units.

St. Joe's University guarantees on campus housing for freshman, and sophomores only, students who has filed their intent to reside on campus by the stated deadline and who have continuously registered as full time students receive housing. Upperclassmen who want on campus housing must submit to a lottery system for available rooms. The school has started developing housing resources for upper classman through it's capital improvement initiatives. The University apartments are new, and beautiful, but only upper classmen can rent them. Information about housing can be found on the quick links page of this document.

Off Campus Housing: Saint Joseph's University has been described as a relatively large private university within an affluent residential community. The reason I have mentioned the overall community is to re-assert the point that St. Joe's network of facilities has encapsulated it's real estate holdings within the area. The campus footprint allows almost every student to have housing within walking distance to the campus. The issue of off campus housing has a different feel to it compared to other university off campus housing demands.

The demand for housing, especially off campus housing is usually a tough issue for institutions attempting to keep students within the general geographical area. St. Joe's has addressed this issue with it's new construction projects on the Maguire campus. The new campus will have additional housing resources for all students according to university officials. The school has also started buying up residential buildings and developing housing networks for current, and future students. Information about available resources can be found on the quick links page.

Public Transportation: Campus transportation resources for St. Joe's students are available through the campus shuttle system, which provides van service for daily classes, student activities, and links to (SEPTA). This service is crucial to students who don't have cars because it provides transportation services to the entire university community. St. Joe's students depend on this service to take them to 6 east, and 6 western areas of the campus including some off campus shopping areas.

The school's van service provides reliable van service to students who don't, or can't have vehicles on campus. The university also has a very large number of out of state students who don't know the streets and highways very well. Knowing the area is key because students who come from local states may know the area better and may be able to walk or drive to local destinations. Foreign, and out of state students might opt to take a bus or train to their destination because they don't want to risk getting lost on local roads.

Description of Campus Public Safety Plans & Procedures: Campus communities are unique places due to their populations and physical layouts. In some areas of the United States you really can't tell where a campus begins or ends because people walk through, drive through, and take campus transportation through all areas of the campus footprint. St. Joe's University has developed public safety plans and procedures to keep students, and employees safe. The school's general public safety plans and procedures can be found in the document "Emergency Preparedness Plan" which gives students and employees a list of instructions, procedures, codes of conduct, and response strategies to follow while on campus. Crisis Management Plans & Procedures Local Community: Historically, FEMA has identified risk factors within specific geographical areas of the United States. The western states have fires and earthquakes, the mid-west has tornados, the gulf, and eastern seaboard states have hurricanes. And finally, the northeast has a combination of snow and wind related weather events. Colleges and universities usually develop plans and procedures that complement local community resources, in some cases schools are required by state and federal law to develop plans and procedures.

The State of Pennsylvania has developed emergency management resources to help residents to prepare, respond, and recover from a host of natural, and man made events. The state agency responsible for emergency operations is the Emergency Management Agency. The OEM has developed 3 core initiatives for the purpose of community crisis, and emergency management. Innovative Emergency Communications: St. Joe's University has developed reverse 911 systems that sends several types of emergency notifications through e-mail and phone text message systems. Campus alerts, and weather related information is sent through this system. The university also has active shooter protocols for students to follow during an emergency including lock-down, and lockout procedures. These messages are usually received within 1-2 minutes of emergency broadcast and allow university officials to adhere to Clery Act requirements for timely warnings of emergency events. Campus Access Control & Security Systems: The design, and physical setting of a particular institution has elements relating to the overall culture and social system on campus. Since college and university campuses are designed to offer (open) movement of people through it's borders, the issue of design, along with effective use of space can reduce both the incidence, and fear of crime. This design feature is called "Crime Prevention through Environmental Control." The proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime and an improvement in the quality of life. The issues of identifying formal gathering and high-risk areas within a campus footprint are also critical to public safety resources because manpower must be observed in these areas.

The design and physical setting of St. Joe's University is unique because the campus is encapsulated within 2 suburban neighborhoods of Delaware Valley. The campus footprint also highlights several historic buildings, which form a large manmade barrier around the main campus. These buildings form a large square that's several city block long, and wide. The physical security design seems to be enhanced by the large walls and limited access points to the campus. These buildings maintain the campus perimeter because they act almost like natural barriers.

The campus has several entrances and exits to maximize the pedestrian traffic flow within the facility, the issue of vehicle traffic on campus is minimal due to the city/suburban setting and a limited number of street parking spots. St. Joe's public safety department deploys officers to several access points around the campus during the day to reduce the number of people who may not have legitimate business on campus. At night, some of these entrances get secured with a lock and chain to further reduce access to the institution. Public safety also maintains visitor screening with clearly worded signage that directs visitors to a welcome area on Lapsley Lane, visitors who wish to walk around the campus without an escort can, but only during daylight hours.

Formal gathering areas within the St. Joe's campus are situated in, and around 2 locations during my visit, the 1st being Gest Lawn, which goes straight through the quad to Champion Student Center, and Hagan Recreation Center. These areas are the main observed focal points of the campus with several large grassy areas in and around the lecture, and residence halls. The quad is a textbook example of CPTED design because it allows for natural surveillance and open space for people to enjoy while still providing some type of ownership within the property. The campuses great lawn ensures open sight lines by keeping buildings and architectural barriers on the perimeter of the space.

The issue of high-risk areas on campus has been identified during annual risk assessments by security, and feedback by all intuitional stakeholders including public safety officials. The department maintains uniform patrol and high tech remote resources to highlight formal surveillance throughout the campus. The department also has security officers posted in several high-risk areas including the student center, sports venues, residence halls, and the library. Public safety also patrols the interior and exterior of the university by foot and patrol vehicles but, St. Joe's public safety officers don't have formal arrest powers; they have to notify Philadelphia, and Lower Merion Township

respectfully to investigate criminal activity on campus. St. Joe's public safety department has developed enhanced lighting, and formal surveillance resources (CCTV) for perimeter areas because it helps with surveillance and gives students and visitors an enhanced feeling of safety and security.

The campus high-risk areas including the residence halls have a higher degree of natural and formal surveillance for students and visitors. Students who enter the residence halls must produce their St. Joe's card that is swiped into an access control reader. Resident Assistants also observe entry into common areas and may ask students to authenticate the person standing in front of them. The system also records the activity with a digital CCTV as a redundant security feature. The residence halls also have a second RA on duty at night, and on the weekends to help manage visitor requests for entry; the procedure requires a visitor to produce I.D. and to sign a formal register.

Descriptions of Published Policies and Procedures to Comply with the Clery Act

The Clery Act. The Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990 requires all postsecondary institutions participating in the Title IV student financial aid programs to disclose campus crime statistics, university violations and disciplinary data, and finally security information to the U.S. Department of Education on an annual basis. The legislation also describes several required policy statements that address public safety and security issues. Below is a sample list of Clery Act Policy Statements for colleges and universities to publish each year within their prospective crime report/audits.

Required policy statements include: addressing timely warnings, disclosure of crime statistics, reporting criminal offenses, confidential reporting, security and access control, arrest authority, security awareness programs, crime prevention programs, sex offenses, alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, substance abuse programs, and general codes of conduct. St. Joe's Clery Act info can be found on the quick links page.

Caveat: St. Joe's University Public Safety officers don't have arrest powers; they call the Philadelphia, and Lower Merion Township Police for crime issues on campus. The university does provide security resources on campus but the following statement from the department education offers this advice. "The department data reported by the institutions have not been subjected to independent verification by the U.S. Department of Education. Therefore, the department cannot vouch for the accuracy of the data. St. Joe's Clery Act crime data can be found at: <http://ope.ed.gov/security/Index.aspx>

Local Crime Statistics: The Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Report for 2008 has developed crime statistics for Lower Merion Township Pennsylvania. In 2008 the Police Department reported 26 Violent Crimes, 0 Murders, 1 Forcible Rape, 18 Robberies, 7 Aggravated Assaults, 949 Property Crimes, 147 Burglaries, 766 Larceny Thefts, and finally 36 Motor Vehicle Thefts. The crime of Arson was reported 0 times in 2008.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Report for 2008 has developed crime statistics for the City of Philadelphia Pennsylvania. In 2008 the Police Department reported 20,771 Violent Crimes, 331 Murders, 1,038 Forcible Rapes, 9,618 Robberies, 9,784 Aggravated Assaults, 62,584 Property Crimes, 12,845 Burglaries, 40,681 Larceny Thefts, and finally 9,058 Motor Vehicle Thefts. The crime data for Arson wasn't reported to the UCR in 2008.

Emergency Medical Technicians (Ambulance Service). St. Joe's University has emergency medical technicians who respond from the City of Philadelphia Fire Department EMS to provide ambulance service to students, residents, and visitors through emergency notification systems.
